Plan to eradicate hardcore poverty by 2025 will begin with 480 localities nationwide, says PM

HE government's Kelu-arga Malaysia hardcore poverty eradication pro-gramme (BMTKM) that gramme (BMTKM) that will begin next month will cover 480 pioneer localities nationwide, with the cooperation of all levels, including state governments.

Prime Minister Datuk Seri Ismail

Prime Minister Datus Per Islinai Sabri Yaakob said the programme would be implemented through several approaches, such as the es-tablishment of poverty units at the federal, state and district levels, setting up integrated and cen-

tralised databases on poverty, imtraised databases on poverty, im-proving bottom-up approach in programmes through the whole-of-nation approach and address-ing the root causes of poverty. He said BMTKM was in line with policies and strategies to eradicate

policies and strategies to eradicate hardcore poverty outlined under the 12th Malaysia Plan (12MP).

"The programme, with the aim of eradicating hardcore poverty by 2025, will start with Phase 1 involving 80 pioneer localities nationalide." tionwide. Phases 2 and 3 will start in September and December, respectively," he said after chairing a menteris besar and chief min-

isters meeting yesterday Phases 4 to 6 would be imple-

mented next year.

"At the meeting, it was decided that state governments need to prioritise and expedite approval of land acquisition for federal

projects.

alignment will be approved on re-serve basis, while operation cen-tres, offices or stations will be ap-proved through awarding of land ownership."

He said state governments would help settle land issues for public projects. He said further discussions would be held on pre-mium rates and taxes to be im-posed by state governments in line with standards set by the Na-tional Land Council. tional Land Council.

He said it was agreed at the meeting that there would be more engagement sessions between fed-eral and state governments on development projects in the states.

On measures to mitigate the impact of uncertain weather brought about by global warming, Ismail Sabri said the government had drawn up 11 short-term and nine long-term initiatives.

He said the initiatives include improving flood mitigation infras-tructure, like pumps, flood gates and generator sets, with the cooperation of state governments.

Other initiatives include main-Other initiatives include main-taining, deepening and cleaning irrigation and flood retention sys-tems, upgrading 516 siren sta-tions, constructing 361 siren sta-tions and upgrading 155 web cam-constructions
